Food for Thought

For a relatively short while in Ireland, around the 70's I think, there was a minor fashion in what were called 'mystery tours'. These usually took place on summer evenings, and normally consisted of visiting a few places of historical or cultural interest, and almost inevitably ended up in a pub. Of course, it was a fashion that was never likely to last for long. For starters, people who had been on one would tell people about it — so it was no longer a 'mystery' and possibly more importantly, people quickly worked out that it was quicker and cheaper just to go directly to the pub! I hasten to say that I was never personally on one of these tours, nor did I ever feel tempted to do so. When I set out on a journey, I like to know where it is I am going! But it doesn't always work out that way!

One of the modern-day inventions that I am very happy to avail of is the sat-nav. I call on it quite a bit if I'm travelling, even to places that I'm quite familiar with — having information on the current state of traffic can be very time-saving. I'm grateful not to have to depend on the well-intentioned people who so often assured me that they knew the best way to get to wherever it was I was going, topped off frequently with the final assurance - "you can't miss it." It must be some special gift I have for achieving the impossible, but time and time again I have most definitely managed to "miss it"!

You may very well be asking – assuming you've got this far – what's brought this on? No, I didn't get lost on Monday on my way to Larne for our Provincial Chapter, which, incidentally, was a very graced time for our Passionist Province. We have elected a new Provincial to guide us through the next four years. He is Fr. Martin Coffey, whom many you

will know from his previous time in office in the early 2000's. We've also elected a new Provincial Council to support him – Fr. John Friel, Fr. Martin Newell, Fr. Thomas Scanlon, and Fr. Gareth Thomas. And they won't need a sat-nav – we have left them with enough directions (probably should be 'directives') to keep them occupied for forty years, not to mind four!

Sorry, where was I before that diversion? Oh yes, I was talking essentially about getting good directions to help us on our journeys. In our gospel today, Jesus's apostles thought they were giving Jesus a good steer when they suggested He should send the people away to get themselves some nourishment after a long day listening to Him. "Give them something to eat yourselves" took them by surprise. But then, Jesus is full of surprises! Having followed Him for some time, they probably weren't that amazed that He could feed over 5000 people from a mere five loaves and two fish. But offering to feed the world with His Body and Blood? That's another level altogether.

And that's what we celebrate today, Corpus Christi, the most holy Body and Blood of Christ. He invites us to do this a memorial of Him – not in the sense of erecting statues, but as re-membering Him. I write it that way to highlight that in this sense the opposite of 'remembering' is not 'forgetting', but 'dis-membering'. And in our hearts I think many of us appreciate that in cutting ourselves of from the Corpus Christi, that's essentially what happens – His body is, as it were, being dismembered. (No puns intended here, but maybe reflecting on the puns might encourage us to reflect a little deeper on the rich mystery we celebrate today.)
