The Exaltation of the Holy Cross

Love That's Not Artificial!

I'll be honest – I'm not a huge fan of the phrase 'artificial intelligence'. In my experience it tends to refer to the extraordinary processing speed of modern computers, which is truly impressive, rather than any independent ability to make intelligent decisions. But let's not go into that – hardly the most relevant topic on a week-end in Mount Argus. That said, having been away all week, I found myself on return having to produce our Parish Newsletter in double-quick time. At this time in my life "double-quick" is not where I feel most at home! A little bit of help and inspiration on-line would not go amiss. A google search on "the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross" seemed like a reasonable procedure. Below is the artificial intelligence response I received.

A reflection on the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross involves recognizing the cross as a symbol of God's life-giving love and victory over sin and death, rather than just suffering. It's about contemplating how Jesus' suffering on the cross led to salvation and eternal life, transforming a symbol of misery into one of triumph. The feast connects to the biblical story of Moses lifting a bronze serpent for healing, showing how the cross serves as a spiritual antidote to the "poison" of sin for those who believe.

To be fair, that is a pretty good summary of many of the key points that the Church would want to highlight in relation to this feast. All too easily when we see reference to the cross we are inclined to focus on the sufferings that Christ underwent on our behalf, whereas we really need to be focusing on the reason why Christ should undergo such suffering – which of course was His infinite and eternal love for us. In drawing attention to the transforming of a symbol of misery – the cross – to one of triumph we can be reminded that in joining our sufferings with those of Christ our sufferings can be transformed into opportunities for growth and openness to Christ in our daily lives.

Unfortunately, for a multiplicity of reasons, this is an area of Parish Ministry that has been seriously neglected over the past while. For some that has meant that they have had no access to Holy Communion and the sacraments of reconciliation and of the sick. I would very much like that it should be a priority going forward – I certainly promise that with my lesser role in parish leadership I will commit to attempting to visit the housebound – those who wish it – at least once per month. I would appreciate if those who would wish a visit could let me know afresh. ('Housebound' need not mean they can never get out, but rather that getting to, and being in church for extended periods, is not really feasible or advisable.)
