30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Once I found myself lost in Cork, and I stopped to asked someone the directions to Wilton where my uncle is buried. With all due respect to Corkonians, they have a different way of speaking. The man in question did not use the words 'right' or 'left', but advised me to veer this way or that way, using his hands to direct to the right or to the left. The surprising thing he said to me was that he would 'not start from here'. He told me to go to a particular spot and from there he gave me directions!

Today's gospel reminds us to start our prayer journey from where we are - we are sinners. It teaches us that true prayer begins with honesty and humility, our acknowledging that we are in need of God's mercy. The tax collector acknowledges his need for mercy, and that sincere humility opens the door to God's grace.

The Pharisee's problem is not his good works, but his belief that these works make him a better person, even superior. He uses them to elevate himself and to judge others, his forgetting that righteousness is a gift from God, not an achievement.

God is moved by honesty, humility and repentance. The gospel today invites us to ask ourselves:

- ⇒ When I pray, do I come to God in honesty and humility, or in comparison and self-righteousness?
- ⇒ Do I trust in my own goodness, or do I depend on God's mercy?
- ⇒ Do I judge others who struggle, or who sin differently than I do?

Like the tax collector, we are all invited to come before God just as we are, in honesty and humility – broken and sinful. God's mercy flows abundantly most freely into humble hearts.

On my return...

First, I would like to thank you all for a very warm welcome on my return to Mount Argus on Friday 10th October – just two weeks ago. My priority is to learn and discern, which of course will mean asking many questions, and that will mean repeating myself... a lot. It will take time to settle in, and despite my having to go regularly to the North over these next few months for various appointments, I hope to be well ensconced by the New Year.

I attended my first Parish Pastoral Council meeting last week, and I am so thankful to the Chair and the members for their commitment to and enthusiasm for, not only our Parish affairs but also the nascent local parish partnership.

As my Gardai vetting is in progress (for confirmation of my appointment as Parish Priest), I am conscious that this is an exercise requiring attention for the staff and volunteers in the Parish, and which I will make a priority during these early months. This will afford me the opportunity to reacquaint myself with familiar faces and to renew connections.
